

Biosketch: Stephen Polasky holds the Fesler-Lampert Chair in Ecological/Environmental Economics at the University of Minnesota, with appointments in the Department of Applied Economics, and the Department of Ecology, Evolution and Behavior. He is also a Resident Fellow of the Institute on the Environment at the University of Minnesota. He received a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Michigan in 1986 and a B.A. from Williams College in 1979. He previously held faculty positions in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics at Oregon State University (1993-1999) and the Department of Economics at Boston College (1986-1993). He served as Senior Staff Economist for environment and resources for the President's Council of Economic Advisers 1998-1999.

He is currently leading efforts to develop methods to value ecosystem services for the Natural Capital Project. He serves on the Governing Board of the Natural Capital Project, the Science Advisory Board of the US Environmental Protection Agency, the Board of Directors for the Beijer Institute of Ecological Economics, and the Board of Directors and the Science Council of The Nature Conservancy. He is a University Fellow at Resources for the Future, a Research Fellow at the Beijer Institute of Ecological Economics, and a Research Associate in the Environmental & Energy Economics Program at the National Bureau of Economic Research.

His research interests include ecosystem services, natural capital, biodiversity conservation, sustainability, integrated ecological and economic analysis, renewable energy, environmental regulation, and common property resources. His research papers have been published in the *Journal of Environmental Economics and Management*, *Nature*, *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*, *Science*, and a variety of economics, conservation and ecology journals.

He was elected into the National Academy of Sciences in 2010. He was elected as a Fellow of the Association of Environmental and Resource Economists in 2011, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2009, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2007.
